





This incredible calamity that took the lives of six million innocent people, almost one-third of them children, was the brainchild of Adolf Hitler, the head of the Nazi Party in Germany from 1933 to 1945.

The Holocaust drenched the soil of Europe with Jewish blood, as the Nazis, often with the cooperation of the local population, built concentration camps where the killing took place.

Then came the <u>roundups</u>. Jewish families were brutally dragged from their homes in <u>the dead of night</u>, packed into <u>cattle cars</u>, and sent to distant concentration camps throughout Europe, <u>primarily</u> in Poland.

Many thousands died from starvation, disease, and torture even before they reached their destination. The survivors were divided into two groups.

Those capable of working were assigned to Nazi factories, where they were literally worked to death, and the others were immediately sent to the gas chambers. The mass killings, at first carried out by death squads in front of open graves, were speeded up with more sophisticated killing devices. Desperate efforts made by Jewish groups in the United States and elsewhere to stop the senseless slaughter of their kinsmen were met with indifference by the Allies.
